We are currently without caretakers so our time is stretched more thinly than usual. Would your family, small group or Sunday School class be willing to take on a project? We can provide housing and meals for groups or individuals willing to volunteer. Projects might include: paint the interior of summer cabins; help finish the main floor bathroom project; replace several non-working bathroom fans; install trim in new cabin & bathrooms; repaint craft room; replace front doors on lodge, split wood/chop kindling; misc. grounds work!

- Marketing? Many of our regular school groups were unable to come to camp this year due to Covid restrictions and others canceled due to budget cuts. From Lilly: Something I am sure I have in common with many of you reading these words is that DCC holds a special place in my heart. My first time at camp was the summer of '15. I was a sophomore and I had been invited by a friend who was a boy, so I was worried I wouldn't have a friend in my cabin. I remember being swept away by how welcoming everyone at camp was. I felt an overwhelming sense of relief and of welcoming that has carried me forward to this day. I find myself with similar feelings every time I go back.

This summer I was honored to be one of the summer camp program directors. Ruby and I faced many challenges, including COVID regulations and rusty memories of camp games, but we built many wonderful new memories as well. A personal highlight was the invention of a new activity that I hope will stay for years to come: *Berry Hike with Kyle!* It was an absolute joy to watch counselor, Kyle Diller, teach campers about various plants at DCC. It was even better to see them return from the activity with their hands covered in sticky berry juice. To me, these joyful memories are what camp is all about. Camp is about learning new things, making new friends, and connecting with nature. I think it is safe to say that we accomplished these things this summer. I'll be dreaming of orange cafeteria tables and stuffy Alsea bunk beds until I can be there again.

From Ruby: Brenda asked, "What does camp mean to you?" My experience this summer changed, for the better, what I think of when I hear the word 'camp'. It was an especially challenging summer for me, but it was also by far the most rewarding. There were big shoes left to fill by the previous program director, and after two years without camp, along with constantly changing covid restrictions, it felt like an exciting, yet daunting task.

Though covid restrictions could have made the summer difficult and boring, my time at camp felt refreshing as a community of campers, staff and Earth knit itself back together after so much time apart. Throughout the summer I found myself continually impressed by everybody's resilience and patience as we figured out how to return to the rhythm of camp. Of course, camp is about the campers, but some of my favorite summer memories come from little moments shared between counselors. My nerves at the start of the summer made me worried about how this group would bond after not having seen each other for so long, but I am happy to report that I saw camaraderie and friendships form that I never expected to see. I remember this year at camp as one full of sun soaked afternoons, belly laughs, and starry nights filled with campers shouting the lyrics to 'Walkin in the Light'.

I now see camp as both a place for personal growth, and a place that inherently creates a community between both your peers and the Earth. I think that there are few places that so easily create such meaningful experiences, and I consider myself incredibly lucky that I get to spend my summers at one such place. 'Thanks' feels like too small a word to sum up my appreciation, but I am so grateful to everyone who makes Drift Creek what it is, and I cannot wait to see what the future of this place has in store.

As I read the reflections of Ruby and Lilly and think about the experiences of my own kids, I am convinced that while we talk so much in orientation about camp being for the campers, I am struck by how deeply the experience impacts the staff! Every year I am asked to write reference letters for former staff, whether it is for jobs, internships, or even med school. It is so rewarding to build relationships with these young adults...to see kids transition from camper to Teen Volunteer to Counselor.
